Discussion Questions

These are some suggested questions to get your discussion started.

- Is there a story in the book that sticks out to you as particularly powerful, sad, interesting, or informative? Discuss how the story impacted you.
- How did the arrangement of the book impact your experience of reading it? What did you
 like or not like about the way the stories are put together?
- Were there any stories that you didn't like as much? Why?
- Many stories touch on moments in time when people were intensely threatened or when staying in their home became suddenly impossible. Does reading about these experiences help you understand the refugee experience better? Are these situations difficult to imagine?
- Are the differences in the stories told by men and the stories told by women? What did you notice in those narratives?
- How does food and cooking factor in the stories? Why do you think food is a common topic in refugee and immigrant stories?
- How do the stories of refugees who grew up as refugees differ from the stories of adults who were forced to flee their homes?
- What surprised you about A Map is Only One Story? What are some major takeaways from the different stories in the book?
- What is the difference between assimilation and integration? How do you think those two concepts have functioned in America?
- How has reading A Map is Only One Story affected your opinion about immigration, migration, citizenship, and being an American?

Nicole Chung is the author of the national bestseller All You Can Ever Know. Named a Best Book of the Year by The Washington Post, NPR, Library Journal, and many other outlets, All You Can Ever Know was a finalist for the National Book Critics Circle Award, a semifinalist for the PEN Open Book Award, an Indies Choice Honor Book, and an official Junior Library Guild Selection.
