Frequently Asked Questions (FAQs)

What is "UNCSW" and what happens there?

The <u>United Nations Commission on the Status of Women (UNCSW)</u> is an official, two-week UN meeting that meets annually, since 1946, to study the conditions facing women and girls around the world, promote women's and girls' empowerment and women's rights in political, economic, civil, social and educational fields, and to make recommendations on urgent problems they face. In 1995, the <u>Fourth World Conference on Women</u> adopted the <u>Beijing Declaration and Platform for Action</u>, a global policy framework for gender equality and the empowerment of women that set out 12 Critical Areas of Concern. Ever since, it has been the policy framework reference for the annual UNCSW meetings. Each year, a priority theme and a review theme – and sometimes, an emerging theme – provide the context for dialogue and decision-making during this important two-week meeting.

The official UNCSW meeting is preceded by preparatory regional meetings throughout the year and then the annual two-week meeting in the spring at UN headquarters in New York City. The annual meeting consists of an ongoing plenary session and side events organized by member states and UN entities. In addition, there are public, "parallel" events that occur at the same time as the UN meeting. These events may take place in the immediate vicinity of the UN, or elsewhere – but they are "parallel" in that they happen alongside, and at the same time, as the official meeting. All the events mirror the themes of the official meeting.

The <u>66th session of UNCSW ("CSW66")</u> will be held from Monday, 3/14 to Friday, 3/25/2022. The priority theme for this year's session will be "Achieving gender equality and the empowerment of all women and girls in the context of climate change, environmental and disaster risk reduction policies and programmes".

Why and how do Episcopalians engage at UNCSW? How will they do so this year?

Episcopalians (and their wider Anglican Communion family) participate in UNCSW because they care about women and girls and want to be part of the global dialogue that seeks to empower them and improve their status worldwide. This year's special focus on the intersection with environment, climate and disaster risk reduction will bring additional, specialized interest groups.

There is a long, proud history of Episcopal engagement with the UN since its founding, and with UNCSW for many years. Many Anglican and Episcopal women were present in 1995 at the Fourth World Conference on Women that birthed the Beijing Declaration and Platform for Action. A very special chapter opened in the 2000s, when women from the Anglican Communion, The Episcopal Church and the Anglican Church of Canada joined forces to bring Anglican women from around the world to UNCSW. Our Anglican/Episcopal engagement has grown and changed since then. It includes grassroots engagement and official, institutional engagement with two accredited delegations, one representing the Anglican Communion and one representing The Episcopal Church. All these efforts, together, have contributed to a sense of community and knowledge of what happens at the UN. Our presence brings the wisdom and experiences of our local parishes and communities as contributors to this global dialogue and, as Episcopalians, we bring our UN experience and insights back home to our local contexts.

In 2014, The Episcopal Church achieved an important upgrade in its institutional relationship with the United Nations, when it was granted consultative status with the UN's Economic and Social Council. As a result, since 2015 The Episcopal Church has been able to bring up to 20 accredited representatives to observe the official UNCSW plenary meetings. Every year since 2015, a delegation nominated by our Presiding Bishop has represented our Church and advocated on behalf of General Convention policies at UNCSW.

Alongside the work of the Presiding Bishop's delegations, Episcopalians continue to come to UNCSW in the same ways they always have. They come to learn, to share their stories and experiences, to meet new people and make new connections, to represent other organizations, and for many other reasons. Their grassroots engagement is vital. One organic and important aspect of this ongoing engagement is that some Episcopalians, who have attended UNCSW faithfully for decades, return year after year to share their knowledge, train and raise up newcomers.

In 2022, in light of UN policies regarding the COVID-19 pandemic, both the Anglican and Episcopal presence will continue virtually, with participants and delegations representing a variety of countries.

How can Episcopalians get involved in UNCSW's 66th session?

Because of the ongoing pandemic, the full two-week **UNCSW** 66 meeting and related parallel events will be held mainly virtually (except for two in-person meetings limited to government representatives and selected civil society speakers). This allows greater and more equitable access for Episcopalians who can participate remotely.

- Educate yourself about the issues and follow UNCSW 66 developments on <u>UN Women's UNCSW 66</u>
 webpage, updates on <u>UN Women's website</u> and read up on the <u>Beijing Declaration and Platform for Action</u>. Read about The Episcopal Church's position in the written statement submitted by the Presiding Bishop to UNCSW 66.
- o Follow UNCSW 66 developments on social media using hashtags #CSW66, #EpiscopalCSW and #GenerationEquality.
- Watch the UNCSW 66 official meeting livestream at webtv.un.org. The entire two-week meeting is livestreamed and can be viewed afterwards, along with past sessions.
- Attend virtual "parallel events" in the UN vicinity. "Parallel events" are organized by civil society organizations rather than by UN entities. There are hundreds of free, public events on offer that relate to the UNCSW themes. Most of them are coordinated by the NGO Committee on the Status of Women (NGO CSW) and once again this year, they will happen virtually. To sign up for all the events via one blanket registration, visit their website and register for the "NGO CSW 66 Forum". Note that registration is individual (not via The Episcopal Church) and free.



- Attend virtual official "side events" at the United Nations. "Side events" are organized by at least one UN member state, and usually involve civil society participation. While the UNCSW meetings are not open to the public, it is possible to attend UNCSW side events this year, as all will be held virtually. Look for the list of side events on the UNCSW 66 website to be posted in mid- to late-February. Be sure to RSVP early, as they fill up quickly.
- O Participate in virtual Episcopal Church events and joint Anglican/Episcopal events. You are warmly invited to join Episcopal Church-hosted events, with the participation of our wider Anglican and faith-based family! Events will be advertised on the Episcopal UNCSW webpage. Additional events offered by Episcopal Relief & Development and the Anglican Communion will be listed on the webpage and a separate Fact Sheet. If you or your church are hosting a virtual event, please let everyone know by submitting an event listing to the Episcopal News Service Events page.
- Apply to be a delegate with the Presiding Bishop's delegation. All are welcome to apply to be considered as a Presiding Bishop's delegate, an accredited representative who observes UN meetings, represents and advocates on behalf of the Presiding Bishop. The application process usually is announced in spring or summer the year before the UNCSW session, via a Public Affairs press release and the Episcopal UN social media, with a link to the application on the Episcopal UNCSW webpage. The application process for CSW66 occurred in January and the Presiding Bishop is expected to announce his nominations in mid-February.
- o Pray for fellow Episcopalians and Anglicans engaged in UNCSW's work, and all participants from around the world. Pray that the decisions made at UNCSW will further women's and girls' empowerment, gender equality and gender justice in the areas related to the theme.
- Follow Episcopal and Anglican engagement at UNCSW via social media and share your own experiences, stories and thoughts via hashtags #CSW66 (official UN hashtag), #EpiscopalUN (all things Episcopal Church and the UN) and #EpiscopalCSW (our Episcopal Church involvement at CSW, continuous reporting from year to year).
- Submit a guest blog to our <u>Episcopal Church UNCSW webpage</u>. Send articles of 250-500 words + photo to <u>EpiscopalUN@episcopalchurch.org</u>.

• Participate remotely with another group or your parish

- Join an Episcopal Church group that is participating remotely. Many Episcopalians choose to participate in UNCSW individually or with a group, such as National Episcopal Church Women, parish youth groups, and others.
- Organize an event in your parish, school or local community that relates to the UNCSW theme. Share your event online via #CSW66, #EpiscopalUN, #EpiscopalCSW and #GenerationEquality.

What Episcopal and Anglican events are happening in New York City during UNCSW?

As UNCSW 66 is almost entirely virtual, there are no in-person events being organized by The Episcopal Church or the Anglican Communion at the Episcopal Church Center in New York.
