Lay leadership is the future of our church.

Helping dioceses and congregations identify and train lay leaders as coaches in Latino faith communities is a priority for Latino Ministries, led by the Revs. Anthony Guillén and Samuel Borbón.

At the forefront of this training effort is the Episcopal Latino Competency Course, which is exactly what it sounds like. Focused on non-Hispanic laity, clergy, and seminarians, the course teaches cultural know-how to those called to serve Latino communities. An intensive seven-day course taught twice a year—once at Virginia Theological Seminary and once at the School of Theology at Sewanee University—the curriculum is designed to enhance Christian formation and expand the reach of our Jesus Movement.

Church Redevelopment — Pilgrimage in Transition

What does redevelopment look like?

It looks like parishioners and clergy working together to re-imagine a new future. But where to start? With data drawn from four years of observation and surveys, the Office of Church Planting and Redevelopment nurtures a spirit of curiosity around the factors that contribute to intentional redevelopment. The data was gathered from their work with 61 dioceses to help discern the call to leadership and help parishes understand the behaviors of successful redevelopment. Hosting quarterly online gatherings to help potential leaders discern their call, church redevelopment staff actively build trust to encourage potential leaders to imagine new ways their parish can grow and try new ways of engaging their “parishes.”

Indigenous Ministries

What will it take to fully comprehend the forced assimilation of Indigenous children at Episcopal boarding schools in the 19th and 20th centuries?

This past summer General Convention resolved to know more and called for the creation of an Executive Council Commission and provided the initial funding to begin investigating The Episcopal Church's involvement.

Once the commission is formed in early 2023, the scope and outcomes of their charge will gain focus. A likely product is the creation of a multi-faceted curriculum exploring our difficult history, and shared throughout The Episcopal Church.

Evangelism – Meeting Jesus and Each Other

Small groups propel evangelism in The Episcopal Church.

Joining our robust array of training and resources is “Centered: A Christian Discipleship Experience.” The series guides small, intentional communities to grow, look, act, and love more like Jesus. The nine-session course invites church members, neighbors, and friends to gather to share a meal, join in prayer, watch short films, and discuss God, belonging, and living a meaningful life.

This program complements our other small group programs and training, and is available in English, French, and Spanish. In early 2023, look for our latest small group resource Living Revival. Designed for congregations to process and deepen their Revival experience.

African Descent Ministries – We Are One

African Descent Ministries—formerly Black Ministries—is the new name for this 50-year ministry of The Episcopal Church.

The name change, after three years of prayerful discernment, broadens our welcome to include ten convocations of the African diaspora, including cultures and communities of African Americans, South Sudanese, Liberians, Afro Caribbean, Latino, Cuban and Haitian, East, South, and West Africans siblings. Anything that we can do, as The Episcopal Church, to remove barriers to communication has a powerful impact on our ministry. With this name change, African Decent Ministries begins new conversations and invites deeper connections throughout The Episcopal Church.

Safe Church Training teaches each of us how to create holy places not just for the church, but for the world. Ensuring that we are caring for the vulnerable, the Office of Faith Formation continues to reevaluate and update the training modules. A recent addition to the training suites reinforces awareness and strategies for LGBTQ+ inclusion. Early in 2023, Spanish-language versions of eight courses will be ready for rollout. Each of the Safe Church/Safe Community trainings is designed to create a

church and a context in which God's dream becomes our reality, with room for all of God's children.
