Frequently Asked Questions (FAQs)

What is “UNCSW” and what happens there?

The [United Nations Commission on the Status of Women \(UNCSW\)](#) is an official, two-week UN meeting that meets annually, since 1946, to study the conditions facing women and girls around the world, promote women’s and girls’ empowerment and women’s rights in political, economic, civil, social and educational fields, and to make recommendations on urgent problems they face. In 1995, the [Fourth World Conference on Women](#) adopted the [Beijing Declaration and Platform for Action](#), a global policy framework for gender equality and the empowerment of women that set out 12 Critical Areas of Concern. Ever since, it has been the policy framework reference for the annual UNCSW meetings. Each year, a priority theme and a review theme – and sometimes, an emerging theme – provide the context for dialogue and decision-making during this important two-week meeting.

The official UNCSW meeting is preceded by preparatory regional meetings throughout the year and then the annual two-week meeting in the spring at UN headquarters in New York City. The annual meeting consists of an ongoing plenary session and side events organized by member states and UN entities. In addition, there are public, “parallel” events that occur at the same time as the UN meeting. These events may take place in the immediate vicinity of the UN, or elsewhere – but they are “parallel” in that they happen alongside, and at the same time, as the official meeting. All the events mirror the themes of the official meeting.

The [67th session of UNCSW \(“CSW67”\)](#) will be held from Monday, 3/6 to Friday, 3/17/2023. The priority theme for this year’s session will be “Innovation and technological change, and education in the digital age for achieving gender equality and the empowerment of all women and girls”.

Why and how do Episcopalians engage at UNCSW? How will they do so this year?

Episcopalians (and their wider Anglican Communion family) participate in UNCSW because they care about women and girls, in all their diversity, and want to be part of the global dialogue that seeks to empower them and improve their status worldwide.

There is a long, proud history of Episcopal engagement with the UN since its founding, and with UNCSW for many years. Many Anglican and Episcopal women were present in 1995 at the Fourth World

Conference on Women that birthed the Beijing Declaration and Platform for Action. A very special chapter opened in the 2000s, when women from the Anglican Communion, The Episcopal Church and the Anglican Church of Canada joined forces to bring Anglican women from around the world to UNCSW. Our Anglican/Episcopal engagement has grown and changed since then. It includes grassroots engagement and official, institutional engagement with two accredited delegations, one representing the Anglican Communion and one representing The Episcopal Church. All these efforts, together, have contributed to a sense of community and knowledge of what happens at the UN. Our presence brings the wisdom and experiences of our local parishes and communities as contributors to this global dialogue and, as Episcopalians, we bring our UN experience and insights back home to our local contexts.

In 2014, The Episcopal Church achieved an important upgrade in its institutional relationship with the United Nations, when it was granted consultative status with the UN's Economic and Social Council. As a result, since 2015 The Episcopal Church has been able to bring up to 20 accredited representatives to observe the official UNCSW plenary meetings. Every year since 2015, a delegation nominated by our Presiding Bishop has represented our Church and advocated on behalf of General Convention policies at UNCSW.

Alongside the work of the Presiding Bishop's delegations, Episcopalians continue to come to UNCSW in the same ways they always have. They come to learn, to share their stories and experiences, to meet new people and make new connections, to represent other organizations, and for many other reasons. Their grassroots engagement is vital. One organic and important aspect of this ongoing engagement is that some Episcopalians, who have attended UNCSW faithfully for decades, return year after year to share their knowledge, train and raise up newcomers.

From 2020 – 2022, during the COVID-19 pandemic, both the Anglican and Episcopal delegations and wider presence at UNCSW continued virtually. We are delighted and give thanks to God that this year will be the first time we return for an in-person and hybrid presence at UN headquarters in New York for CSW67.

How can Episcopalians get involved in UNCSW's 67th session?

For the first time since the COVID-19 pandemic began in 2020, the full two-week UNCSW 67 meeting and related parallel events will be held in hybrid format (in-person in New York and virtually). This allows greater and more equitable access for Episcopalians who can participate remotely.

• In New York City

- *Become a delegate with the Presiding Bishop's delegation.* All are welcome to apply to be considered as a Presiding Bishop's delegate, an accredited representative who observes UN meetings, represents and advocates on behalf of the Presiding Bishop. The application process usually opens in December in the year before the UNCSW session, via a Public Affairs press release and Episcopal UN social media, with a link to the application on the [Episcopal Church UNCSW webpage](#). The application process for CSW67 occurred in January and the Presiding Bishop is expected to announce his nominations in mid-February.
- *Come on your own or with an Episcopal Church group.* Many Episcopalians choose to come to UNCSW individually or with a group. In past years, there have been groups from Anglican Women's Empowerment, National and New York-based Episcopal Church Women, the Anglican Church of Canada, parish youth groups, and more.
- *Attend "parallel events" in the UN vicinity.* There are literally hundreds of free, public events on offer in hybrid format that relate to the UNCSW themes. Most of them are coordinated by the [NGO Committee on the Status of Women \(NGO CSW\)](#). To sign up for all the events via one blanket registration, visit their website and register for the "[NGO CSW/NY Forum](#)". Note that registration

is *individual* (not via The Episcopal Church) and free, and you do not need to be a member to register. Once registered, look for the list of parallel events on NGO CSW's website and related apps beginning in late February.

- *Attend official "side events" at the United Nations.* "Side events" are organized by at least one UN member state, and usually include civil society participation. While the UNCSW meetings are open only to accredited delegates, it is often possible to attend UNCSW side events that are held on the UN premises. Look for the [list of side events on the UN Women's CSW 67 webpage](#) to be posted in late February. Events requiring an RSVP usually are open to the public. Be sure to RSVP early, as they fill up quickly.
- *Participate in joint Anglican/Episcopal worship and events.* You are warmly invited to join Episcopal Church-hosted events, with the participation of our wider Anglican and faith-based family! Events will be advertised on the [Episcopal Church UNCSW webpage](#). If you or your church are hosting an event, please let everyone know by submitting an event listing to the [Episcopal News Service Events page](#).
- **Remotely**
 - *Educate yourself about the issues* and follow UNCSW 67 developments on [UN Women's UNCSW 67 webpage](#), updates on [UN Women's website](#) and read up on the [Beijing Declaration and Platform for Action](#). Read about The Episcopal Church's position in the written statement submitted by the Presiding Bishop to UNCSW 67.
 - *Watch the UNCSW 67 official meeting livestream* at <https://media.un.org/en/webtv>. The entire two-week meeting is livestreamed and can be viewed afterwards, along with archived sessions.
 - *Follow UNCSW 67 developments* on [UN Women's dedicated UNCSW webpage](#) and social media using hashtags #CSW67 and #GenerationEquality.
 - *Follow Episcopal and Anglican engagement at UNCSW via social media and share your own experiences, stories and thoughts* via hashtags #CSW67, #EpiscopalUN (all things Episcopal Church and the UN) and #EpiscopalCSW (our Episcopal Church involvement at CSW, continuous reporting from year to year).
 - *Organize an event in your parish, school or local community* that relates to the UNCSW theme. Share your event online via #CSW 67, #EpiscopalUN and #EpiscopalCSW.
 - *Pray for fellow Episcopalians and Anglicans* engaged in UNCSW's work, and all participants from around the world. Pray that the decisions made at UNCSW will further women's and girls' empowerment, gender equality and gender justice.
